## In Adirondack Daily Enterprise:

## **Ongoing Opportunities for Artists**

## **New York State and National Grant Opportunities**

<u>The Rauschenberg Emergency Grant</u>: "NYFA and the Rauschenberg Foundation have teamed up to offer **visual and media artists and choreographers** in the US grants of up to \$5,000 for medical related emergencies." [Rolling]

<u>The Adolph & Esther Gottlieb Emergency Grant</u>: "The Adolph and Esther Gottlieb Emergency Grant program is intended to provide interim financial assistance to qualified **painters, printmakers, and sculptors** whose needs are the result of an unforeseen, catastrophic incident, and who lack the resources to meet that situation." [Ongoing/no deadline]

<u>The Pollock-Krasner Foundation</u>: "The Pollock-Krasner Foundation's dual criteria for grants are recognizable artistic merit and demonstrable financial

## artists over a significant period of time." [Ongoing/no deadline]

<u>CERF+ The Artists Safety Net</u>: "An applicant must be a professional artist working in a **craft discipline (such as potter, metalsmith, glass artist, woodworker, fiber artist or furniture maker**) who has had a recent, career-threatening emergency and be a legal U.S. resident. In addition to submitting a completed application form, an applicant is required to provide documentation about his/her craft career and the emergency" [Ongoing/no deadline]

## ICYMI: CRNY Announces Artist Employment Program Recipients!

June 30: New York, NY—Creatives Rebuild New York (CRNY) today named its Artist Employment Program (AEP) recipients, 98 collaborations involving a dynamic group of 300 artists employed by community-based organizations, municipalities, and tribal governments across New York State. A total of \$49.9M in funding will support artists' salaries and benefits, with an additional \$11.7M in funding provided to the organizations holding employment. Participating artists will receive an annual salary of \$65,000 with benefits and dedicated time to focus on their artistic practice.

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#### \$125M TOWARD ARTISTS' FUTURES

Creatives Rebuild New York (CRNY) is a three-year, \$125 million initiative that provides guaranteed income and employment opportunities to artists across New York State. CRNY believes that artists are workers who deserve equitable, sustainable support structures, and that improving the lives of artists is paramount to the vitality of New York State's collective social and economic wellbeing. Fiscally sponsored by Tides Center, CRNY represents a \$125 million funding commitment, anchored by \$115 million from The Andrew W. Mellon Foundation and \$5 million each from the Ford Foundation and Stavros Niarchos Foundation (SNF). Learn more at <u>creativesrebuildny.org</u>.

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
