Grantmakers in the Arts (GIA) invites individuals and nonprofit organizations to <u>express</u> <u>your support</u> for Senators Mark Warner (D-VA) and Todd Young (R-IN), and Representative Suzan DelBene (D-WA)'s legislation to incentivize states, localities, and nonprofit organizations to experiment with portable benefits models.

Individuals, nonprofit organizations, and community foundations can endorse legislation and public agencies, while independent and family foundations cannot. If you are uncertain whether you can endorse this bill, GIA provides an overview of who can and cannot endorse legislation here.

"Good Luck, and Bad, on New York's Sidewalks." CRNY Guaranteed Income Artist Felix Morelo was featured in *The New York Times* for his public chalk art found around New York City. "[Morelo] has been making public art in New York City for more than a decade. But during the coronavirus pandemic, he started concentrating on the spots, instead of more figurative pieces. He saw an opportunity to build his brand from interactive art at a time when public space in the city felt

especially charged. Mr. Morelo has been homeless in the past... He is a full-time artist, but he lives below the poverty line, he said. On tough days, the bad luck spots sometimes feel like a constructive way to handle his anger, his frustration and his pain." (June 15, 2023)

"New Haven Arts Orgs, Broadway Heavy Hitters Shine With 'Shimmer'." CRNY Artist Employment Program Artist and New York-based director Jess McLeod is involved in *Shimmer*, a new musical by playwright and Guggenheim Fellow Sarah Schulman, featured in *Greater New Haven: arts council.* "We see New Haven as a place that has a lot to offer for artists looking to develop their work... Between the local arts scene and the infrastructure that is already there with all of the really supportive arts organizations, New Haven is a place where artists can really thrive." (June 5, 2023)

"New bike racks add artistic touch to streets of Potsdam." CRNY Artist Employment Program Artist James Gonzalez was featured in *Watertown Daily Times* for creating artisan bicycle racks. "If you notice animals riding bicycles in Potsdam, you are not hallucinating; two artisan bicycle racks forged by artist James Gonzalez have been placed along Market Street in the village, with a third to be installed at Ives Park." "Colburn, Creatives Rebuild New York artist and Seneca wolf clan descendant, has led the initiative as part of her efforts to bring awareness of indigenous culture to Jamestown and its surrounding areas." Indigenous women's activism in Mexico and its diaspora
weaves in and between local, national, continental, and

testimonials and twenty years of fieldwork spent
accompanying Indigenous women activists, Blackwell
focuses on how these activists navigate the blockages to their
participation and transform exclusionary spaces into scales
of resistance. Blackwell shows how activists in Mexico and those in the migrant
stream that runs from Oaxaca into California redefined women's roles in community
decision-making."

GRANTS AND AWARDS

Social Services and Emergency Financial Assistance: Entertainment Community Fund offers free and confidential social service programs addressing a wide array of challenges faced by people in performing arts and entertainment. Emergency financial assistance is available for people who are unable to pay their immediate basic living expenses (housing, food, utility bills or health care). **Deadline:** Rolling | entertainmentcommunity.org/am-i-eligible-help



the Arts offers their largest grants program for organizations, providing comprehensive and expansive funding opportunities for communities. Applicants may request cost share/matching grants ranging from \$10,000 to \$100,000. Designated local arts agencies eligible to subgrant may request from \$30,000 to \$150,000 for subgranting programs in the Local Arts
